### **From Our Library**

Dic Drees is on vacation so this review is a reprint from November, 2005.

**Dic Drees** 

A recent addition to our Library is the purchase of <u>Taunton's Complete</u> <u>Illustrated Guide to Finishing</u>, by Jeff Jewitt. This is another book in a fine series of books published by Taunton Press. As the title indicates, this book is about finishing.

First of all, this book is meant to be used, not put on a shelf, so if you check out this book and like it, it can be purchased pretty easily and inexpensively on the internet at www.half.com or other similar sources.

In the pages of this book you'll find a wide variety of methods that cover the important processes of this area of woodworking. There are often many ways to get the same result. Why you choose one method over another depends on several factors: time; type and quantity of tools; your skill level; and the project you're making.

To find your way around this book you first need to ask yourself two question; What result am I trying to achieve? What tools do I want to use to accomplish it? In some cases there are many ways and many tools that will accomplish the same result. In others, there are only one or two sensible ways to do it. The book includes every reasonable method and then a few just to flex your woodworking muscles. To organize the material, the subject is broken down to two levels, "Parts" are major divisions of this class of techniques, "Sections" contain related techniques. In the Table of Contents, the first thing you'll see in a <u>Part</u> is a group of photos keyed to a page number. You'll see the photo representing each section in that part, along with the page on which each section starts.

Sections begin with an "overview" to the methods de-You'll find scribed therein. important general info on this group of techniques and about specific tools needed for the operations that follow and how to build jigs needed. The step-by-step essays are the heart of this book. Here a group of photos represents the key steps in the process. The text describes the process and guides you through


Driving instructions are as follows:



## **Edge Trimming Guide**



Trimming the solid-wood edging glued to a plywood panel has always been one of my least favorite tasks. So I'm always look-

ing for a quick, easy, and accurate way to get



it done. The router table setup you see in the photo at right just might be the final answer.


The key to the operation is a tall auxiliary fence that supports the plywood panel. It's simply attached to the router table fence with double-sided tape. But now look close and you'll see that the fence is suspended above the table top so that the oversize edging on the panel can pass beneath it (see drawings). Finally, a narrow cutout in the fence holds the flush trim bit that's used to trim the edging.

Once the auxiliary fence and the flush trim bit are in place, the edging on the panels can be trimmed with a single pass along each side. The result is a great-looking panel and a woodworker who gets to move on to something more interesting.
