The March minutes and treasurer's report were approved.

**President's report** We will collect Beads of Courage Boxes at the June general meeting and

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deliver them to Advocate Children's Hospital in Oak Lawn. Peter has more beads ordered.

#### Standing Committee Reports

**Membership** (*Mike Kalscheur*) – Mike reported we added two new members to start to offset the losses when the members roll was reduced in March by those who had not yet paid 2020 dues. The new roster total is 175.

Library (*Tim McAuley*) – Half of the library has been loaded to the new software app. We need access to the library to finish that process. 

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## The 33rd Annual Arts & Crafts Conference

**Grove Park Inn, Asheville, NC** – My wife, Barbara, and I attended this conference for the first time a few weeks back, February 19-24 to be exact. I thought I'd write up a report for the membership while it was still fresh in our minds.

Since we like Arts & Crafts homes and furniture, and we live in a 1919 home that I have built A&C furniture for, we were excited to finally make one of these conferences in our retirement. We had seen it advertised in American Bungalow magazine over the years and we always said we would do it someday.

The conference has been held at the Grove Park Inn for 33 consecutive years. The Inn was built in 1910 in less than a year. Among many other neat things about it, it has a poured concrete roof that gives it a very distinctive look. Combined with the use of stone walls, the original owners claimed it was fireproof. The lobby is immense with two huge fireplaces at either end. The Inn also has a world class spa, which we highly recommend.

Quotes abound inside the Grove Park Inn. They are carved into the mirror in your bathroom, in the stone of the great fireplaces, and on grandfather clocks and other furniture unique to the GPI.


We were told on a tour of the Inn that it was one of the first hotels to incorporate electric light throughout. The bulbs used were manufactured by Edison General Electric. The maximum wattage for each bulb was 15 watts. That was the brightest bulb they made at the time. It must have been pretty dim inside.

Speaking of tours, the Vanderbilt Mansion is very close and worth the trip. On the days we were in Asheville it was cold and it snowed the day we went to the Vanderbilt Mansion. If you go to this conference, bring layers. Asheville is at about 5,000 feet at the foot of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Barb and I elected to enroll in one of four preconference classes; she chose embroidery and I



chose block printing. Each class was limited to 14 students and consisted of a Wednesday afternoon and a Thursday morning session for a total of about 7 hours. Classes were taught by Roycroft certified artisans; *Natalie Richard* taught Barb embroidery and *Laura Wilder* taught me block printing. These Roycrofters

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
have to be certified every year in their craft. *Frank Glapa* is a Roycrofter artisan who taught a coppersmithing class, which was full when I went to enroll, so that's why I ended up in the block printing class. He lives in Evanston and is interested in being a future presenter at one of our monthly meetings to demonstrate making copper clockfaces, inlays and other items that can enhance a woodworking project. Barb is working on her embroidery as I write this. I now have a complete kit for making greeting cards and other things using block printing. I just have to go to Dick Blick for linoleum blocks or make my own.

The conference exhibits open on Thursday afternoon. The conference is divided into three sections, all of which will sell you stuff; antiques, contemporary crafts and books. The line to get into the exhibits on Thursday afternoon was long, presumably so collectors could get first shot at some antiques by Roycroft, Stickley, and other famous artisans. The antique section of the show has dealers from all over the country exhibiting and selling A&C furniture, vases, prints, textiles, lamps, etc.

In addition to the participants like us who stay at the Inn, locals can buy day passes for \$10.00. About 1200 attend over the three days of the conference. With our conference passes we were able to attend the sections as many times as we wanted. I only saw one exhibitor who was sold out. He was in the contemporary section and sold A&C-style prints.

*Natalie Richard, Laura Wilder, Frank Glapa* and other Roycrofters were all exhibiting in the contemporary section of the show. Barb bought a copper necklace from *Amy Brandenberg* who makes A&C style jewelry. She moved to Ashville from Downers Grove. Of note, I also met *Brian Brace* and *Nancy Hiller* at their exhibits. Brian is a Roycroft Renaissance Certified Artisan (aka Roycrofter) and a fine furniture maker in the Asheville area using a contemporary twist on the classic A&C style. Brian is a really nice guy and makes beautiful furniture. We talked a lot about how he sources his wood.

**Nancy Hiller** is an expert in English Arts & Crafts Furniture, and she makes custom furniture and cabinets in Bloomington, IN. She led a discussion group on English Arts & Crafts Furniture which I attended. She told us that the main difference between the American style and the English is that the latter is more light and joyful. But Nancy acknowledges that she is not an expert in the American version. She was trained in furniture making

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in England. Nancy is on the cover of the March/April issue of Fine Woodworking with a "recipe" on how to build an antique chest in the English style. I also bought her current book, which outlines three "recipes;" a sideboard, a table and a chair, all in the English A&C style.

Barb and I also attended some other discussion groups: Native Plants and the Arts & Crafts Landscape and Furniture 101 – A Walking Tour of the Grove Park Inn's Collection. For fun we attended a reception for the Craftsman Farms Museum in New Jersey, attended the world premiere of a documentary film about the life of **Gustave Stickley** sponsored by the same museum, went on a local house tour sponsored by the Asheville Preservation Society, saw a performance by a **Frank Lloyd Wright** impersonator that was very funny, and saw a photofilled lecture on "The Bungalow Goes to Hollywood" by **Douglas Keister**, who is the co-author and photographer for many books about bungalows and Arts & Crafts homes.

If you are ever interested in attending this conference, let me know. We would be happy to share our experience more fully!
