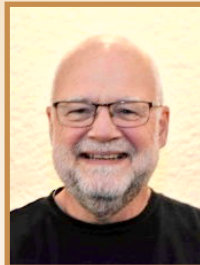

## January Program Recap

### 3M Xtract system

Jack Mohler, representing 3M's Xtract Cubitron II system, explained the concepts behind a new sanding product, both the hand-held random-orbit sanders and the various discs that go with them.

The sander he brought was pneumatic, with a dust collection bag. He said pneumatic tools are common in industrial settings but there are also slightly less powerful electric models. The main virtue of the system is tremendous suction with the disc and sander combination, so that nearly all of the dust is sucked into the bag. A shop vac can be used, but the bag is more efficient—although it is intended to be disposable. (About \$8.00 per bag but they last a long time.) Bags can be reused but he does not recommend doing so. He said the sanders retail for between \$250 and \$300, although I checked prices at Amazon and the pneumatics were about \$200 and the electric upwards of \$350. He said the bag is not HEPA rated but is 1% away from being so rated.

The discs come in various grits and hole patterns, or no holes at all in the mesh versions. They work on any make sander and there are both hook and loop and adhesive versions.



Muller said that the discs have a high cut rate and tend to last longer than



aluminum oxide discs because they do not let sanding debris build up on the disc. The debris goes into the bag or shop vacuum. He said the high cut rate is due to "precision shaped ceramic grain," essentially tiny triangles arranged on the disc with the points pointing down. Aluminum oxide sandpaper has what he called "round granules that tend to collect debris." He said their discs with holes rather than mesh have 48 holes in the 6" discs and 32 holes in the 5" discs.

George Rodgers gave a brief testimonial about the effectiveness of these discs compared to other manufacturers, but warned that a pancake air compressor will not be powerful enough to drive the pneumatic models of these sanders.

Members were especially struck by the sheer size and capability of the machinery on display. Highlights included a *massive three-phase wide-belt sander* that could flatten and finish material with incredible precision, a *gang straight-line rip saw* that demonstrated both speed and accuracy, and an array of *veneering machines* that offered a fascinating look into

to see so many possibilities under one roof.

A huge thank-you goes to **John Jossund**, the owner, for generously opening his facility to our club, and to **Brian**, our tour guide, who walked us through each stage of the operation with enthusiasm, clarity, and deep knowledge. Brian's explanations made industrial-scale woodworking approachable and engaging, even for those of us more accustomed to one- or two-

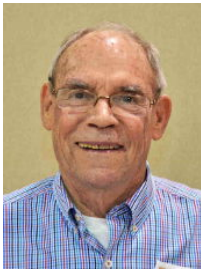

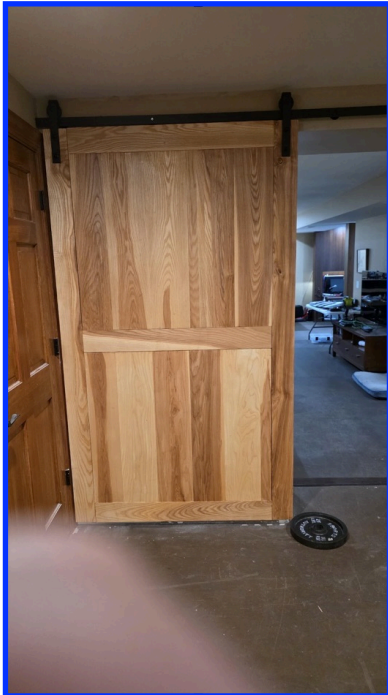
